## About Multiple Sclerosis

Multiple sclerosis interrupts the flow of information from the brain to the body and stops people from moving. Every hour in the United States, someone is newly diagnosed with MS, an unpredictable, often disabling disease of the central nervous system. Symptoms range from numbness and tingling to blindness and paralysis. The progress, severity and specific symptoms of MS in any one person cannot yet be predicted, but advances in research and treatment are moving us closer to a world free of MS. Most people with MS are diagnosed between the ages of 20 and 50, with more than twice as many women as men being diagnosed with the disease. MS affects more than 400,000 people in the U.S., and 2.5 million worldwide.

It is an extremely exciting and pivotal time for the National MS Society. You may notice that the National MS Society has been given a new look with a new mission. Our strategic response calls for us to be **bold, relevant, inclusive, transparent and engaging.**

With our new brand platform we are introducing a new call to action: *Join the Movement*. It is critical that we make what it means to live with MS **relevant** to the general public. The demand for local service programs continues to grow. During 2006, we responded to over 30,000 inquiries from people looking for information about MS. All combined, over \$2.3 million dollars was spent to provide people with MS much needed services and programs enabling continued independence. Whether someone received a wheelchair, a visit in their home or nursing home, had their house modified to be more accessible or had their voice heard in the Halls of Congress, the National MS Society was **inclusive** in changing the lives of 15,000 Ohioans living with the devastating effects of MS.

These services come at a price and once again, our generous communities responded by **engaging** in our fundraising events. The MS Walk raised over \$1.2 million and the "Pedal to the Point" Bike Ride raised over \$1.1 million. The Dinner of Champions Gala in Cleveland and Columbus collectively raised \$615,000.

Ohio made history in 2006 by becoming the first state in the nation to have its legislature officially pass an act to designate the month of March MS Awareness Month. The Ohio Governor, as well as key top officials, helped the Society to create awareness about multiple sclerosis throughout the media and within our communities. We hope that our efforts are **transparent** and will spark a movement that will propel Ohioans to assist us with our ultimate goal...to end the devastating effects of MS.

As you can see, the programs and services provided in 2006 by the Ohio Buckeye Chapter are dedicated to moving toward a world free of MS. ## We are **bold** in the fight against MS.

The National MS Society, with help from many supporters and volunteers, celebrated the month of March as MS Awareness Month. It was a historic occasion, as Ohio became the first state in the nation to have its legislature pass a law to designate a month for MS awareness.

During a legislative luncheon at the Statehouse Atrium, the Governor signed a bill into law to officially recognize March as MS Awareness Month. The governor was surrounded by MS advocates including Representative Kenny Yuko and Senator Teresa Fedor who introduced the bill.

Many advocates wrote letters of support, provided testimony and made personal phone calls and visits to legislators to educate them about MS and the issues that are important to people with disabilities.

One individual, Kurt Landefeld, was recognized for his longtime advocacy efforts at the Society's National Conference in Orlando, Florida. Kurt worked closely with Representative Yuko and other legislators to get the MS Awareness Month legislation passed.

Kurt was inducted into the Advocacy Hall of Fame for his service on the Government Relations Committee for 17 years and his six-year commitment as the committee's chairperson. Kurt has been an effective, energetic advocate and longtime member of the Board of Trustees who is dedicated to raising awareness about MS.



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One of the most visual activities of awareness month was the lighting of the LeVeque Tower. There was a festive lighting ceremony as the landmark building illuminated the skyline red for the entire month.

One highly visual campaign was the “Face of MS” billboards. The billboards were prominently displayed throughout the United States including more than 20 billboards in the Akron, Cleveland and Columbus areas. Vanita Oelschlager was featured several times after she read her new children’s book “My Grampy Can’t Walk,” to a class of third-grade students at Lake Ridge Academy in North Ridgeville. Those plans were put on hold shortly after Jennifer discovered she was pregnant. Eight weeks later, the couple discovered to their delight they were having twins! After careful monitoring and two weeks of hospitalized bed rest, Allison Grace and Amanda Faith were born.

"Whether life tosses you a chronic disease like MS, infertility issues, career bumps, or personal challenges, you always have a choice in how you respond," Jennifer said. "Our response is to take each day as it comes, be grateful for our blessings, and always have hope."

## Equipment Loan Program

For 30 years, Rita Novak has lived in her two-story home with her husband Frank. Even though she has lived with MS for 25 years, it didn't affect her ability to negotiate stairs until about two years ago.

Rita was extremely careful on the stairs but she was still fearful of falling. She no longer has to face that fear since a stairway lift was installed in her home, through the Society's Equipment Loan Program. The program provides assistance with durable medical equipment and aids to daily living items. Many items, such as walkers, wheelchairs, scooters and hospital beds are provided on loan and can be kept for as long as needed or until insurance coverage can be approved.

The stairway lift has allowed Rita to get around her home and spend time with her family, providing her with newfound independence and helping her to improve the quality of her life.

"This is the best gift I've gotten in a long time," Rita said. "I want to thank the Society for making my life easier and full of hope."

## Wellness Programs

Barbara Krause has always had an adventuresome spirit but she was forced to slow down after she was diagnosed with MS in 1992. Multiple exacerbations left her with occasional muscle spasms, spasticity, and a weak right leg and foot, evidenced by foot drop. For long distances she relied on a scooter for mobility.

As a strong proponent of exercise, Barbara joined the aquatics class at the Akron General Health and Wellness Center. The exercise program featured an exercise routine of stretching, arm resistance exercises, and specific deep-water exercises that promote strength building for the legs.

Barbara has gained added confidence and a sense of accomplishment through her exercise regime. She has also gained more strength and endurance to perform everyday tasks.

"Though we all know results for any MS therapy are individual, I can say it has changed my life for the better," Barbara said. "The adventurer in me plans to utilize any exercise or therapy that is helpful so I can remain in control of my MS."

# We are a driving force of MS **research**, relentlessly pursuing prevention, treatment and a cure.

## Research Highlights

- By the end of fiscal year 2006, the Society invested \$500 million in research-related programs since its founding in 1947. This investment is paying off in significant progress toward finding treatments and in better diagnosis, rehabilitation, and symptomatic therapy for people with all forms of MS.
- More than \$26 million was committed in 2006 to support 67 new MS research projects as part of the \$50 million international effort to spur momentum in cutting-edge MS research.
- More than \$7.4 million was granted to 21 researchers at Baldwin-Wallace College, Case Western Reserve University, Cleveland Clinic Foundation, Cleveland State University and The Ohio State University.
- The Promise 2010 Campaign has continued the quest to raise \$30 million for innovative study into highly promising areas of research for nervous system repair and protection, pediatric MS treatment centers, the Sonya Slifka Longitudinal Study of MS, and the MS Lesion Project.
- At the end of 2006, the Ohio Buckeye Chapter had \$245,000 pledged toward the \$750,000 commitment to the Promise 2010 Campaign. The commitment toward the Promise 2010 campaign continues to grow as we see more individuals interested in these targeted research initiatives.



During the Cleveland Dinner of Champions, Sam and Maria Miller, pledged \$20,000 in honor of Dr. Delos Cosgrove and Andrea Hahn. In addition, Mal and Barbara Mixon and Dominic Visconsi donated an additional \$20,000 each for an exclusive dinner at the home of Umberto Fedeli. All proceeds went toward the Promise 2010 Research Campaign.

## Program Highlights

- Services were provided to 10,415 people with MS and responses were provided to 30,690 requests for information.
- Informational packets were mailed to 13,193 people and 198 people requested books, videos and audio tapes from the lending library.
- Forty educational programs were held with experienced, knowledgeable speakers.
- Twenty-eight professional education programs were held at hospitals, long-term care facilities and health-related agencies.
- Four overnight retreats were held for couples, young adults and self-help group facilitators.
- Employment consultations were provided to 2,599 people.
- Social and recreational programs were attended by 1,465 people.

## Fundraising Highlights

- The Christopher & Banks MS Walk presented by Giant Eagle and Serono/Pfizer generated more than \$1.2 million from 8,550 walkers at 13 MS Walk sites. More than 500 volunteers helped with the event.
- The MS 150 “Pedal to the Point” Bike Ride presented by Giant Eagle drew 2,030 registered riders, 400 volunteers and \$1.1 million in funds.
- The Dinner of Champions Gala in Cleveland honored Dr. Delos Cosgrove, President and CEO of The Cleveland Clinic Health System, with the Norman Cohn Hope Award. Dr. Carl Kohrt, President and CEO of Battelle, was honored at the Columbus Dinner of Champions. The events raised a total of \$615,000.
- The Women Against MS Luncheon honored retired social worker Pat Baird and raised nearly \$45,000.
- The MS Walleye Fishing Tournament featured 19 boats and raised nearly \$30,000.
- Third-party fundraisers donated nearly \$50,000 in funds through a variety of events including golf outings, bowl-a-thons and poker runs.

For the past 20 years, the MS Bike Ride has been one of the largest events for the National MS Society. One rider who has been the driving force behind the success of the Bike Ride is Tim Pistell. As captain of Team Parker and the top fundraiser for the past four years, he inspires other cyclists to do the same. Through this event and his service on the Chapter’s Board of Trustees, his fundraising efforts have generated more than \$196,000. Tim was inducted into the Volunteer Hall of Fame for Fundraising during the 2006 National Conference in Orlando, Florida.

- More than 820 visits were made to homebound and nursing home residents through the friendly visitor and holiday bag programs.
- The Equipment Loan Program provided 543 individuals with new and repaired equipment along with auto and home modifications.
- Ongoing support was offered through 43 monthly self-help group meetings facilitated by trained volunteers.
- Advocates visited the offices of 50 legislators at the local, state and federal levels.
- College scholarships of \$3,000 were awarded to four high school students.
